

Martin Luther lived in Germany more than 500 years ago. Luther was monk and priest in the Roman Catholic Church. He was also a professor teaching at the University of Wittenberg.

On October 31st, 1517 Martin Luther posted 95 statements on the door of the church in Wittenberg, inviting church leaders to talk about some teachings of the church that seemed to strongly contradict the Bible.

And so began the Lutheran Reformation





- 1483– born to Margarethe and Hans.
- 1501- Enters University
- 1505- Makes the decision to become a monk
- 1507– Luther ordain a priest and celebrates his first mass.
- 1510– Luther travels to Rome.
- 1517– Posts the 95 Thesis On the Church door
- 1518– Charged with Heresy– false teaching
- 1520– Luther burns papal bull.
- 1521– Excommunicated. "Famous Here I Stand" Diet of Worms.
- 1521– Luther taken to the Wartburg Castle– hid out.
- 1522– Luther returns from Wartburg.
- 1525- Luther Marries Katherine.
- 1527– Luther writes "Mighty Fortress
- 1529– Luther writes the Small and Large Catechism
- 1530– The Augsburg Confession is presented.
- 1530-1546– Various writing and ministry occurrences.

1546- Luther dies.

When Martin Luther nailed the 95 Thesis to the Church Door in Wittenberg on October 31, 1517 We can suspect that he may have never imagined what would transpire.

Luther discovered the Gospel truth by turning back to the Sole Authority of the Bible. During this time the Church at Rome was very powerful and Church leaders felt that they had authority over the church and could insert teaching that they deemed important; even if they contradicted the message of the Bible.

With such an understanding they saw no problem with the sale of indulgences to fund the building of St. Peter's Church in Rome.

When Luther stood for the Word of God and not the tradition or most popular ideas of his time, he was met with huge opposition. It would have been pretty easy to give in, but Key Bible Passage 2 Timothy 3:16-17

Key Terms Grace Authority The Word of God

Luther couldn't. He stood the ground of faith. He stood firm in the word! And for him it may have seemed impossible, but by God's grace and in his time huge change and reform happened for the church! As a result people came to know the TRUTH and this TRUTH set them free helping them to know God for who he is- LOVING and GRACIOUS!

The Christian Lutheran Faith

As Christian Lutherans we believe that Forgiveness Salvation and life have been won for us by Jesus. We cannot work or earn forgiveness; and it certainly isn't obtainable by our own merits. Today, some church continue to teach that our "good works" contribute to salvation and rightness in God's eyes?

Can you think why a works based model is so difficult and could lead one to ultimately despair?

How does a focus on what God has done make all the difference? It doesn't lead to despair, but hope and certainty. Why?

As Christian Lutheran's, **we believe in the sole authority of the Bible.** "Scripture no more and Scripture no less." In other words, we don't add to the word or subtract from the word to serve our own purposes. God has given us his Word as a gift to point us to Jesus. He has also given us the Word as a sort of road map for life; it helps us to see God's will and desire for our lives. A lot of people in our world today feel that we "map out our own course." we define our own truths and authority rests on the individual. You and me have a rock Solid foundation in God's Word. We can never go wrong with God and he always has our best interest in mind... even if it isn't easy. Faith seems to be the "Road less traveled" today; its easy for us to think it isn't as relevant as other things. WE HAVE TO STAND FIRM! Why is it important to stand firm in faith? Why does it matter to you very personally?


The Old Testament


39 books.
